HISTORIC FIREPLACE RESTORED AND RETURNED TO SERVICE

In mid-November, between rain storms, major work was done on our oldest and most historic fireplace.

You may know that last spring there was a chimney fire in the parlor fireplace, quickly quenched by Innkeeper **David Durr**. Before lighting any more fires, we got the 112-year old fireplace and chimney inspected and found the interior needed some serious TLC.

The Inn and cabins are on the National Register of Historic Places. So our repair work needed to be historically sensitive. When we were done, there should be no sense anything had changed, that we had the same hospitable fireplace a century of visitors had always known.

A lengthy (phone) search took us to historic fireplaces on Civil War battlefields in Virginia and the company that had restored them, Fire Safe Industries. I mentioned we were on the National Register and needed a contractor that knew how to manage our repair and yet keep the historic elements intact. They knew a company that restored 40 National Register-listed fireplaces at Bryce Canyon for the National Park Service, dozens more on the north and south rims of the Grand Canyon and the famous El Tovar hotel. (We're a year older than the El Tovar. They opened in 1905.)

On the phone, Boston Brick and Stone in Pasadena, spoke of improving fireplace performance with code-compliant parts while keeping the visible historic parts unchanged.

That's what we have. Photos and captions show some of the work.

The best news: the parlor fireplace was back in service the week before Thanksgiving.



Boston Brick & Stone's 35-foot scaffold looms over the Inn as masons restore and improve airflow in the 112-year old chimney.



Boston Brick & Stone plastic barrier helped keep the Inn clean. During "demo" (demolition) a fan was atop the chimney sucking dust and dirt out.



Remnants of the 112-year old clay chimney liner await removal from the parlor fireplace. Note the missing firebrick at the back. We're deepening the "firebox" as part of improving the "drafting" of the fireplace. Historically correct firebrick, the same kind of brick used originally, will cover the back wall and look no different than the fireplace we remember after a few fires.

IN MEMORIAM: JOE LUDI

West Point Inn's most senior member, since 1954, Joe Ludi passed peacefully just shy of his 93rd birthday. He was far from shy in personality, wit and energy. Until the week before, Joe was planning the annual Luau and Cinco de Mayo parties at Lake Park Retirement where he lived.

Joe grew up in New Mexico. His parents had 12 children, 4 of whom did not survive childhood. In 1940 he rode a train to San Francisco to see the World's Fair, fell in love with the City and made it his home.

Joe served in the Navy, worked for Getty Oil, Diamond International and Notre Dame de Namur University in Belmont. Upon retirement he taught English as a second language to children, helped tourists through Traveler's Aid and the elderly at S.F. Senior Center. For the West Point Inn he served many pancake breakfasts, did many work parties and received the Rusty Spike Award for his contributions. Joe took exotic excursions around the world. In his later years his favorite trip was taking BART to S.F. where he dined at In-N-Out burgers, caught a movie and had a street car ride past his old haunts.

Joe was a regular at WPIA Annual Old Timers events. This year's event was dedicated to his memory. His estate designated WPI as recipient of memorial donations in his honor.

WPIA WEATHER REPORT

On a gloomy, foggy, drippy day did you ever cancel the idea of hiking up Mt. Tam and later learn that it was warm and sunny at the Inn, above it all? Problem solved.

Welcome your new weather station installed above the Innkeeper's Quarter and transmitting real time weather data worldwide via the Internet.

A grant from the California Alpine Club Foundation provided the funding to purchase a Personal Weather Station (PSW) replacing old instruments above the chimney near the Inn's East end fire escape.

Weather stations have historically been a part of Mt. Tamalpais. The Weather Service maintained a station on East Peak until the 1920's. The Air Force monitored the weather closely when it occupied property on Mt. Tam. There exists an automated weather and wind system on West Peak, accessed by phone. The Marin Fire Department volunteer fire lookouts report the wind, weather and humidity twice daily (11 a.m. & 2 p.m.) during the fire season (June - October) with reports going to Marin Fire Department Headquarters in Woodacre.

The West Point Inn, mid-mountain at 1800 ft. elevation, exists in a kind of micro-climate, just above the fog but affected by it. It's also exposed to westerly winds that make it differ from West Peak or East Peak. The Inn is located in a main hiking, biking and general use area of Mt. Tam and its weather station can provide more accurate information for

these activities. Also, historical records are worth having. The long-term impact of weather at the WPI may prove valuable scientifically and environmentally, such as anomalies in the weather that might be related to global warming.

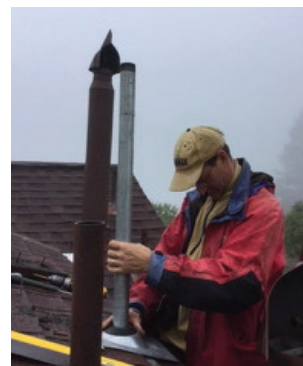

WPIA 2016 AWARD RECIPIENTS

In keeping with tradition at the WPIA Annual Fall Membership Meeting special awards are given to show appreciation to members who have been exemplary in their dedication and devotion to the Inn. At the October 16, 2016 meeting the following individuals were recognized.

RUSTY SPIKE AWARD - BRENDA ROBERTS

The Rusty Spike Award is the WPIA President's award to someone who has been especially helpful during the year. A member since 2008, Brenda is Building & Grounds Chair, a position she has held for many years. Most notably she dedicated an enormous amount of time toward the new ADA cabin. Beginning 2008 and after six years of extreme effort the cabin is finally being built. Brenda has always been in motion tending to the needs of the Inn and cabins with attention to preserving the historic fabric of the Inn. She is a past President of the WPIA. She hosts pancake breakfasts, helps with work parties, special events, etc. She received her first Rusty Spike Award in 2012. With the 2016 award she has the distinction of being the first "double" WPIA Rusty Spike Award recipient.

WALL OF FAME AWARD - GAGE SCHUBERT

The Wall of Fame Award is presented to someone who has a long history of being very involved with benefiting the Inn. Gage became a member in 1975 and immediately became active in improving and preserving WPI grounds and structures. He liked hands-on big projects work such as installing a water line from the Hummingbird Tank down to the Inn during summer drought when he rented a backhoe from Big 4 Rents, purchased 30 PVC 4" X 20' pipes, trucked them in and helped dig the trench for their placement. He was involved in sewer repair/replacement. During that period the MMWD and State Park Superintendent trusted him with keys to all the gates for vehicle access, a privilege he respected. Gage worked many pancake breakfasts, many work parties, many events. He helped conceive and financially benefited building the Innkeeper quarters in 1986. He was a major contributor to the WPIA Centennial 100 Year Campaign in 2004 when the Inn needed a new foundation. Gage served as WPIA President in 1985. He fits the Wall of Fame recipient criteria of "exemplifying the spirit of the West Point Inn".

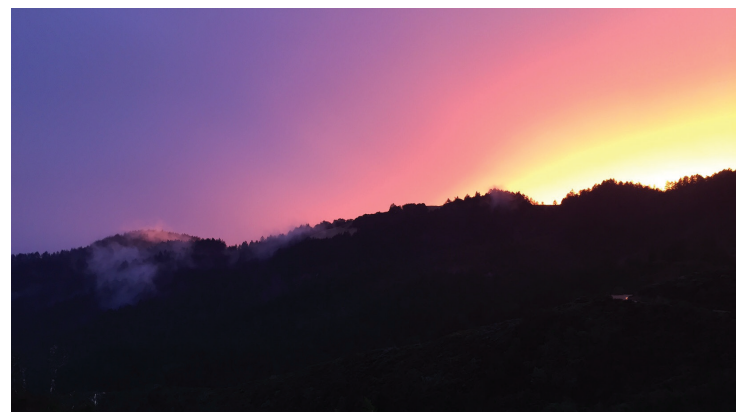

THE NEW “EMIG” CABIN

It's the first cabin built at West Point in 98-years.

The last cabin constructed was our “Honeymoon Cabin”, built in 1918, by Dr. Washington Dodge, a man who survived the RMS Titanic in lifeboat 13. The new Emig ADA Cabin is a mix of old and new: modern construction techniques but the look of something that fits with the other cabins.

This construction began as an idea by former Buildings and Grounds chair **April Dubois**, c 2008, as a way to meet ADA requirements without modifying existing historic buildings. A long process of ideas and revisions and approvals finally resulted in the Marin County Planning Commission granting approval this past fall.

Over most of the last 7 years, **Brenda Roberts**, West Point's current Buildings and Grounds chair, has shepherded the project through dozens of meetings, finding a contractor and now supervises the construction work. Funding for the project is from the Emig Foundation.

Photos illustrate the progress since the first shovelful of earth was scooped from the ground, October 24, 2016. Anticipated completion is early part of 2017.

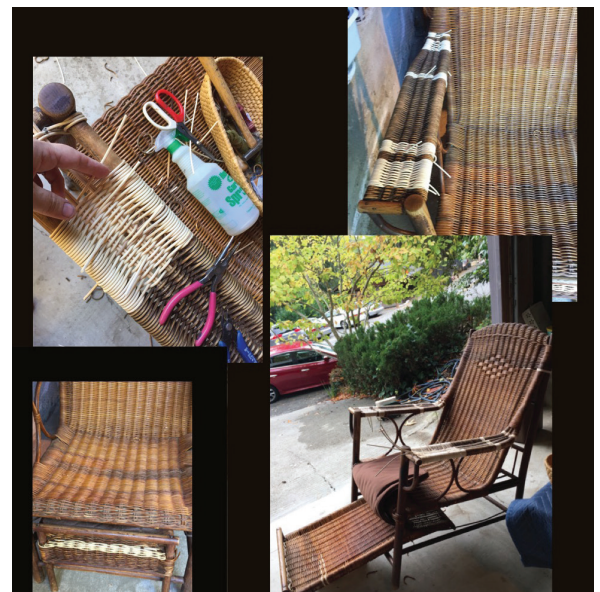
BURNING NOTES FROM THE FIRE & SAFETY COMMITTEE

With beginning of the rainy season, our work thinning brush, technically “vegetation management,” below the Inn be will be put to rest until next March or April. The progress we have made made is significant. Our dedicated crew under the guidance of **Ken Malvino** have been working in an area on the south-facing slope between 100 and 300-feet below the building complex. Reducing the volume vegetation creates an environment (defensible space) that dampens an approaching fire and should protect the buildings from radiant heat and/or direct flame impingement, two major sources of ignition. There were two known fires that threatened the Inn. One was in 1913, and the other in 1916, a 100 years ago +/-! Both started deep in Redwood Canyon. The vegetation, (fuel load), often measured in “tons per acre,” on the mountain and around the Inn was nowhere near what we have today.

We are excited about the restoration of fireplace in the lounge to its original safety and splendor. We are thankful for the many people who worked so hard to make this project happen.

We are always looking for volunteers to help protect the Inn from fire, both inside and out. If you are looking for a way to serve the Inn, members who would like to join our committee.
